- Anotace: Tento pracovní list je zaměřen na čtenářskou gramotnost v anglickém jazyce. Příběh se několikrát (podle počtu skupin) vytiskne a rozstříhá na jednotlivé odstavce. Úkolem žáků je seřadit odstavce příběhu tak, jak jdou správně za sebou pracují ve skupinách. Dále každý žák dostane svůj pracovní list a samostatně vypracují cvičení týkající se textu vyhledají slova, která se hodí k definicím (v závorce mají napsaný slovní druh). Poté odpovídají na otázky a nakreslí obrázky ilustrující příběh. Zdatnější angličtináři mohou příběh stručně převyprávět.
